Agency Guideline for EMS Providers Reporting Exposure or Illness with Suspicion of COVID-19 Infection

Purpose: To provide guidance for LSAs when their personnel report illness consistent with COVID-19 infection, or after their personnel report close contact with a patient screened positive for COVID-19, while not wearing the recommended PPE.

Definition

Exposure: Refers to any close contact with a patient who screens positive for COVID-19, without the recommended PPE (mask, gloves, eye protection).

- I. EMS providers should report any exposure to a patient at risk for COVID-19 to their employer, as soon as possible
- II. Following the report of an exposure by EMS personnel to a patient who has screened, or tested positive for COVID-19 infection, EMS providers may be permitted to return to work as long as they are asymptomatic.
 - a. A mask should be worn while working at all times by the exposed EMS provider for a period of 14 days following the exposure.
 - b. The EMS provider may be allowed to continue working as long as he/she remains asymptomatic.
 - c. If symptoms develop, the EMS provider should no longer be permitted to continue working.
 - i. Symptoms include:
 - 1. Fever, malaise, body aches
 - 2. Cough, sore throat
 - 3. Nausea/vomiting, diarrhea
 - d. In the presence of symptomatic illness with suspicion of COVID-19, LSAs should recommend that their EMS providers stay home, in self quarantine, and monitor themselves for indications of more serious illness.
 - i. Following recovery, EMS providers should not be permitted to return to work any sooner than 24 hours after their fever breaks without medications to control a fever.
 - e. Agencies should NOT refer their personnel for COVID-19 testing unless any of the following conditions are met:
 - i. The EMS provider possesses risk factors for serious complications related to COVID-19 infection, including:
 - 1. Older adults (over 65)
 - 2. Chronic medical conditions, like:
 - a. Heart disease

- b. Lung disease
- c. Diabetes
- ii. Or, the EMS provider develops indications of serious illness, including:
 - 1. Chest pain
 - 2. Shortness of breath
 - 3. Difficulty breathing
- iii. If symptoms associated with serious illness develop, EMS providers should seek immediate medical attention, and provide notification of his/her risk for COVID-19 infection.
- f. Based on the above criteria, when COVID-19 testing is indicated, it should be coordinated by each agency's EMS Coordinator, or Captain and their agency's medical control hospital.
